Delta County Ambulance District Exploring Program

Health Care Exploring is a hands-on program that exposes students with interests in learning more about health care careers and opportunities. This program is for young men and women older than 14, and offers firsthand experience working alongside EMS crews, and learning about careers in nursing, physician, pharmacist, EMT, physical therapy, psychology, sports medicine, and dentistry. Each week a group of kids and adults prepare and serve a dinner and donate money raised to a local cause. All local groups and organizations are eligible to apply for funding. Each week, a group of parents and kids are scheduled to prepare and serve dinner. Most of the members of the crew arrive to work after school and begin preparing the pasta and setting the tables. Colorado College is committed to bringing a diverse group of students from our local area and region to campus who are interested in learning more about a liberal arts college and experiencing an undergraduate college course while still in high school. The scholarship allows students to take one of Colorado College's undergraduate classes for credit through Summer Session courses. At Colorado College, students take one course per Block of three weeks and two days; Block B: Monday, June 18 – Tuesday, July 10, or Block C: Thursday, July 12 – Friday, August 3. The scholarship covers full tuition for one course (4 semester hours), room and board, and books. A travel allowance may be available upon request. The scholarship has a \$4,300 value. Depending on the number of applications and qualified applicants, we may also have partial scholarships available. **Only current Juniors may apply.** This program hopes to serve students who have shown leadership, service, and a commitment to

promoting diversity in their own community. Colorado Mountain College First Ascent Camp for Freshmen

First Ascent Youth Leadership provides a one-week intensive experience for current eight and ninth graders (next year's 9th and 10th grade) at CMC's Leadville campus. The First Ascent Leadership program is a five-day residential program. This year, students will have an opportunity to stay at the dorms at our Timberline Campus at Leadville.
